Brave new world

As the world emerges from Covid-19, what and where will luxury travellers have on their mind? They'll likely seek private trips, wellness retreats, exclusive-use properties and remote locations

ith the world currently on pause, no one knows how soon any kind of normal travel patterns are going to kick back into action or, when they can travel, where affluent consumers are going to want to go, how they'll get there and what they'll be looking for.

But industry consensus is along the lines that we will see a magnification of habits we'd already started to recognise anyway: much richer, experiential trips; remote places and off-the-grid travel; travel that can prove its sustainability; and multigenerational travel that really allows them to connect with family. Add into that some new potential paranoia about crowds and health concerns and the pent-up demand to just see friends and family, perhaps missed birthday and special occasion gatherings, and if you're of a positive mindset, there could even be huge potential for travel companies to help plan some major trips coming out of this.

But as Misty Belles, managing director of global public relations for Virtuoso, says: "We know that luxuy travel tends to lead the way in terms of pick-up, but much like after the global financial crisis of 2008, they are unlikely to want to be seen doing so in any obvious way, so discretion and privacy will be key."

There are already signs of a spike in interest among private jet charter companies too, with people looking for a more controlled way of flying.

"Hygiene concerns involved with flying commercially will certainly lead to more people chartering a private jet for going on holiday; people are nervous and want to keep their families safe," says George Galanopoulos. Luxaviation UK's co-founder and chief executive. "You choose the aircraft and the people who accompany you; you can arrive at the FBO just 15 to 30 minutes before departure; and avoid queues and crowds at every step.

"Private jet charter isn't necessarily out of budget for everyone either – if you're used to flying business or first class, it's not always a big step up in terms of price, but it's a significantly elevated experience in terms of efficiency, safety, and fuxury." he adds.

It could be that 2020 remains sluggish, making the pressure for availability even keener in 2021 and accelerating the need to get travellers to commit to plans for next year, or literally miss out in some places.

"With most prices held at 2020 levels and good value flights, now is the time to book 2021 in Africa," says Kerry Golds, managing director of Abercrombie & Kent, about its Sanctuary Retreats range.

"Lodges are in big demand for 2021; we're seeing peak season dates sell out, as people realise most of them offer masses of space, and with an average of just eight to 10 rooms per lodge, we've always practised physical distancing.

"Travellers also need to come back, of course, so their tourist dollars can keep poaching dollars at bay. So many projects in Africa rely on tourists, whether it be Masai dancers, Zambian bead-makers or rhinos under conservation."
